Welcome to the GCPOMS bi-monthly newsletter *The Epitaph*. This past May was a very busy month for the Greater Cleveland Peace Officers Memorial Society. We teamed up with the Cleveland office of the FBI and Cleveland Police with the Light Northern Ohio Blue campaign in remembrance of Fallen Officers. We handed out blue light bulbs and saw many blue lights in windows and lamp posts throughout the cities in Northeast Ohio. The Ohio Turnpike along with ODOT also were part of this annual event this year. The Turnpike Commission had all their Maintenance and Service Plaza buildings along the entire Turnpike lighted in blue for Police Week. Thanks again to Home Depot and Ace Hardware for supplying blue light bulbs. We will continue this event next year to remember Fallen Peace Officers who have made the ultimate sacrifice for the protection of others.

I want to thank all of you who made our Peace Officers Memorial Week a success. This includes all volunteers and sponsors. It was nice to meet new volunteers and families of some of the Officers honored this year who came out and helped place markers in cemeteries in Northern Ohio on the graves of the Fallen Officers whose names are etched on the Walls of the Greater Cleveland Peace Officers Memorial at W. 3rd and Lakeside Avenue (Cleveland). Survivor/Hudson Police Sqt. John Dean began the Grave Marker Project with his father Thomas Dean in 2011 following the death of their brother/son Boston Patrol Officer Jarod Dean (EOW 1/09/2009). Olmsted Twp. Police Chief Matt Vanyo assisted with organizing the Candlelight Vigil at the Memorial. GCPOMS Trustees Strongsville Sgt. Dave Tomcho and University Heights Patrolman Chris Russo spent most of the day before the Memorial Ceremony cleaning and washing the Memorial Walls in addition to setting up tables, chairs and assisting with centering the stage for the Service. Bratenahl Patrolman Dave Lisk made sure transportation was set-up and running smoothly. Ohio State Highway Patrol Officer Lieutenant Darren Huggins assisted during the Memorial Service and also read names of Fallen Officers. Sergeant Adam Doles and Trooper Chris Aussie assisted with the Ceremony preparation and escorted Survivors into the park during the Memorial Service. Trooper Rayetta Kanters, Trooper Ryan Hershey and Trooper Dora Abshire assisted with the check-in of Survivors before the Ceremony began. Veteran's Administration Patrol Officer Todd Vogler did a terrific job organizing this year's Parade. We saw a lot of new and old faces that have not attended a service for a few years. We honored four Officers whose names were inscribed on our Memorial. Their families were so honored to be present and appreciated the support that is given to them and making sure the sacrifices of their loved ones were not in vein. It was great to see and hear 9-year-old Olivia Gresko give her tribute in honor of her father Willoughby Patrol Officer Jason Gresko (EOW 09/12/2012) during this year's Memorial Service. Olivia was strong and showed a lot of courage to stand in front of all, to share a memorial presentation she had written for her father.

Tony Rizzo ESPN Cleveland was this year's Emcee for the Memorial Service. Tony is one of the biggest supporters of GCPOMS. He was honored to be part of our Service and promised he will be return next year as our Emcee. Through his RBS (Really Big Show) Golf outing. Tony has donated over \$60,000 to GCPOMS over the past 8 years. Tony closes his show everyday on the radio reminding everyone to keep Peace Officers and First Responders in their prayers. This confirms Tony's commitment in supporting and caring for law enforcement.

After this years' Memorial Service there was a light lunch for the Survivors, and again this year Mission BBQ sponsored the lunch. OLIVIA GRESKO PRESENTS A TRIBUTE To her father patrol officer Jason Gresko

Hello. My name is Olivia Gresko and I am the daughter of fallen Willoughby Police Officer Jason Gresko. I am 9 years old and finishing the third grade, but when my dad made the ultimate sacrifice on September 21, 2012, I was only 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ years old. I was little and didn't understand.

Eight months later, my mom took me to Washington DC for Police Week. We attended many events, I met The President, we honored the fallen at a candlelight vigil and visited the Police Memorial where I found my dad's name. 141 names were added with my dad in 2012. Today, more than 21,000 names are on that wall. I have gone to Washington DC for Police Week every year since my dad's name was added to the memorial, and again this year. We just returned a few days ago.

I am honored to be here today at the Cleveland Memorial, and thank you for remembering the fallen. The names on these walls are brave heroes that you have promised to never forget. My dad did not put his badge on to be a hero. He did it because he knew he could make a difference. And that made him happy. He wanted to serve and protect. He promised to keep us safe and treat others with respect. He was the best dad and I miss him very much. I know his memory lives in me and my mom and all the people who were lucky to know him.

When I was three, the blue line was just a color made by a crayon. Fast forward six years to today and I will tell you that the blue line is my family. They are the people who I have learned to love, respect, honor and depend on. They are always there for us, and I am so grateful. Thank you for always remembering. I know my dad is smiling.

God bless our fallen, and all of you.

BADGES OF COURAGE

Lake County Deputy Sheriff James A. Wheeler and retired Painesville City Police Department Lieutenant Gerry Lynch have made it their personal commitment to Honor the memories of the 190 Fallen Officers who have made the ultimate sacrifice in the Line of Duty from the 5½ Northern Ohio counties represented by the Greater Cleveland Peace Officers Memorial Society. Each name of the Fallen Officers is etched on the granite Walls of the Memorial located at West 3rd and Lakeside Avenue in Cleveland. This tribute was captured in an impressive photo of the 15'x25' United States Flag taken by Gus Chan, Staff Photographer at The Plain Dealer. The powerful photo memorializes this annual remembrance during the GCPOMS Memorial Parade preceding the Memorial Ceremony at the Monument. The Flag is carried by 30 local fellow law enforcement Officers and First Responders, along with Officers from Canada, Germany, England, Australia, Chicago, New York, Las Vegas, and New Orleans over the past 20 years.

The U.S. Flag carried in the GCPOMS Memorial Parade is borrowed from the Painesville Elks Lodge and was first carried by Jim Wheeler and Gerry Lynch with the assistance of 30 students who had just graduated from the DARE Program at a local Cleveland high school. The friendships which have developed over the years among the participating law enforcement Officers remains strong. For instance, Tom Cody and Rick Toolis, both retired Chicago Police Officers, return to Cleveland each Police Memorial Week to participate in the Parade and other Police Week events sponsored by GCPOMS. Both are also members of the Chicago Police Department Emerald Society Pipe Band. Rick organizes the GCPOMS Rib Roast and cooks the ribs, and both he and Tom help serve the attendees.

Deputy Wheeler is completing his 30th year in law enforcement. He spent his first ten years in law enforcement with the Lakeland Community College



Police Department and has also served as a part-time Police Officer with the City of Kirtland in Lake County. He has been a Deputy Sheriff with the Lake County Sheriff's Office for the last 20 years assigned to the Sheriff's Court Services Division.

Jim Wheeler and Gerry Lynch make it clear that the United States Flag they carry each May in the GCPOMS Memorial Parade is not about them, but about the Fallen Officers who have made the ultimate sacrifice for the safety of others and also for their loved ones they left behind. The Flag Project is a symbol of their respect for each of the Officer whose name is etched on the Memorial Walls and in memory of the sacrifices made by each who lost their lives serving their communities. The United States Flag is a moving and impressive symbol of this Great Country which reinforces the commitment that the Fallen Officers will never be forgotten.
